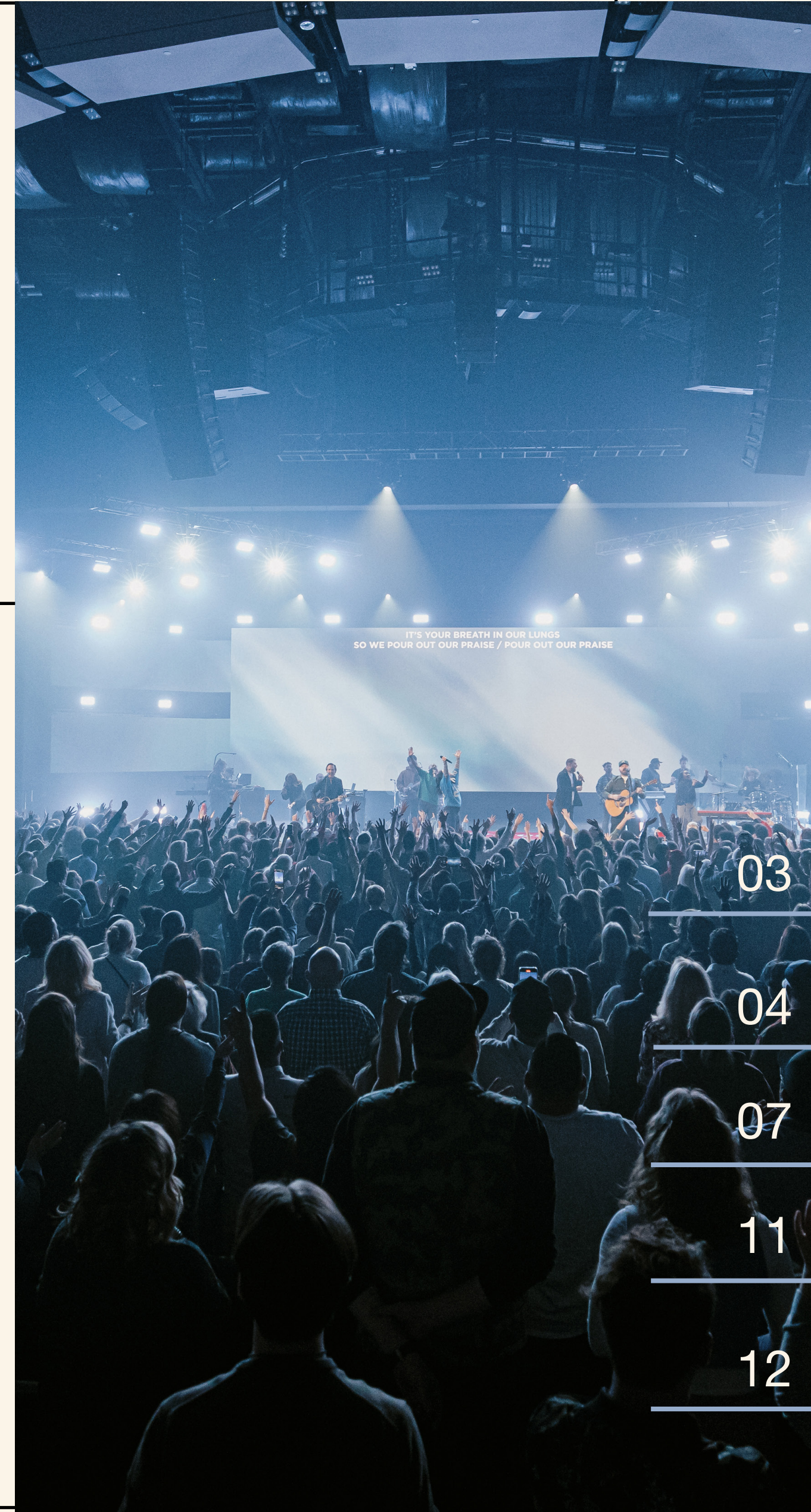

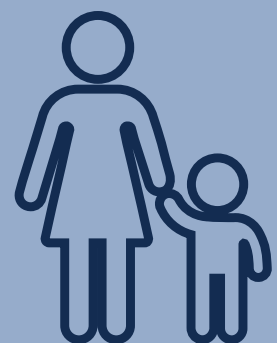

Christmas with Dad

Late last year, prison guards at the Michael Unit in East Texas were planning a Christmas event to reunite inmates with families, but those plans fell through.

That's when Gateway Church stepped in.

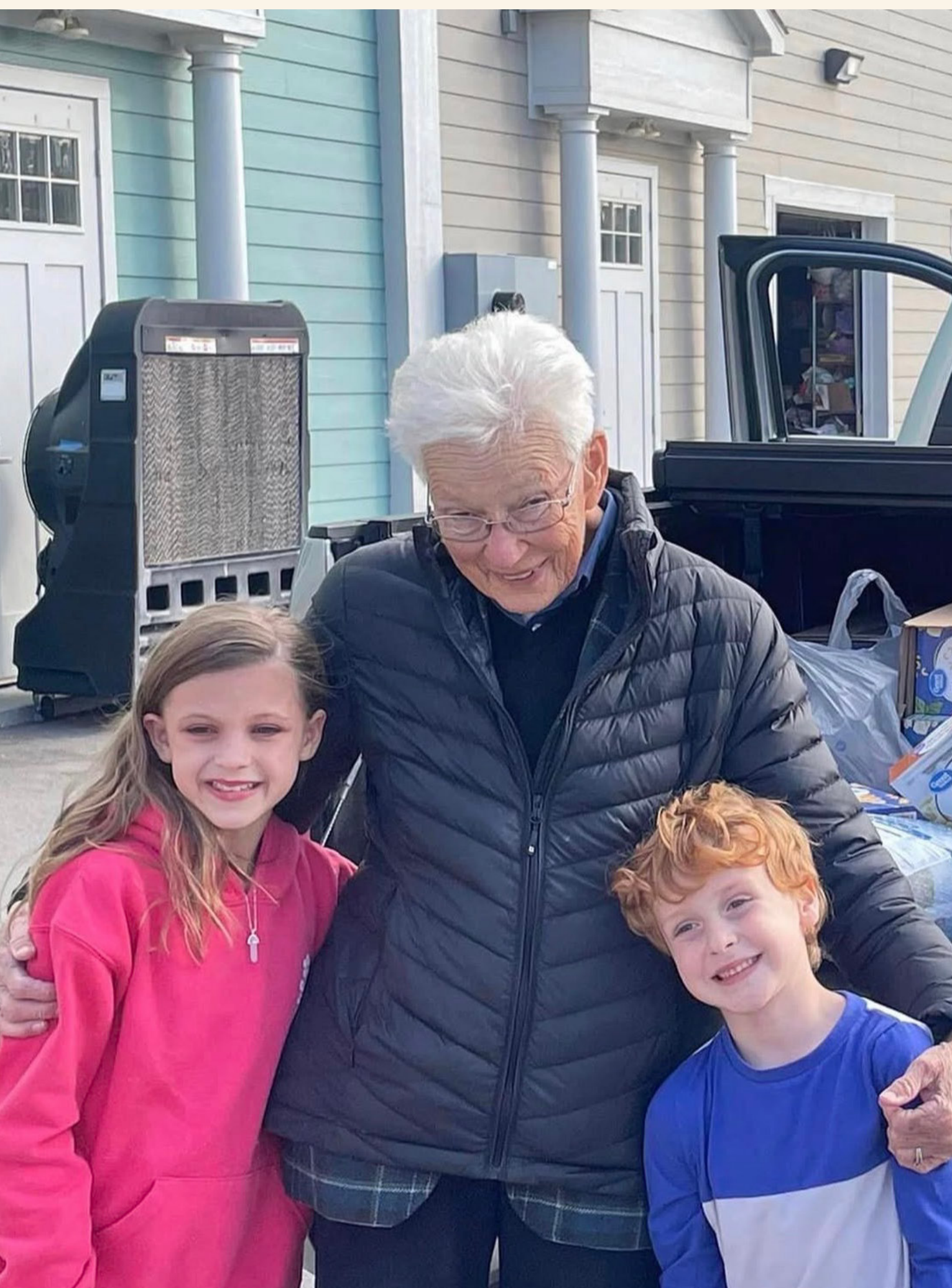
On December 27, Gateway helped facilitate "Christmas with Dad," which brought families together—some for the first time in decades. Inmate Jason Hall hadn't seen his son since he was incarcerated 20 years ago for armed robbery; at the Christmas event, the father and son were reunited, and Jason got to meet his baby grandson for the first time.

Strengthening inmates' relationships with loved ones on the outside has been a huge part of Gateway's prison ministry approach. In fact, big events are on the horizon. In February, Gateway hosted the first-of-its-kind marriage conference, bringing 50 inmates together with their spouses for a one-day event to renew their vows and strengthen their marriages.

Thanks to Gateway's investment in a permanent-sound system with all the live production components

needed to hold a service at the Michael Unit, ministry events like "Christmas with Dad" and the marriage conference are simple to facilitate. "We come here because we are on mission to show inmates the love of Jesus," says Scott Graham, a Gateway Prison Ministry volunteer. "These guys need to be reconciled with the Lord and with themselves, and that trickles down to their families, marriages, kids, and the people around them—that's what we are trying to facilitate."





Mission of Love

Out of every dollar donated to Mission Arlington, 98 cents goes directly to the people they serve. Not many nonprofits can make that claim. So, when the generous people of Gateway made the Love My City donation to Mission Arlington in 2025, the \$50,000 gift they received went a long way helping people get their lives back on track, keep their electricity on, avoid eviction, purchase food, and take care of their children.

For more than 39 years, Mission Arlington has been helping people meet physical, emotional, and spiritual needs, whether that's help with rent, gas money, medicine, or after-school programs for kids. This organization has had a significant impact in communities in Arlington and beyond, and Gateway is blessed to support their mission. Now, they serve hundreds of people each day, adding up to more than 56,000 families each year.

“The partnership with Gateway Church and Mission Arlington has been longstanding, and they supported us when we didn't have much,” says Miss Tillie Burgin, Mission Arlington's founder and executive director. “I remember them coming out with pallets of food when we needed it. That \$50,000 donation from Gateway will help more families feel God's love in a real, practical way, right when they need it most.”

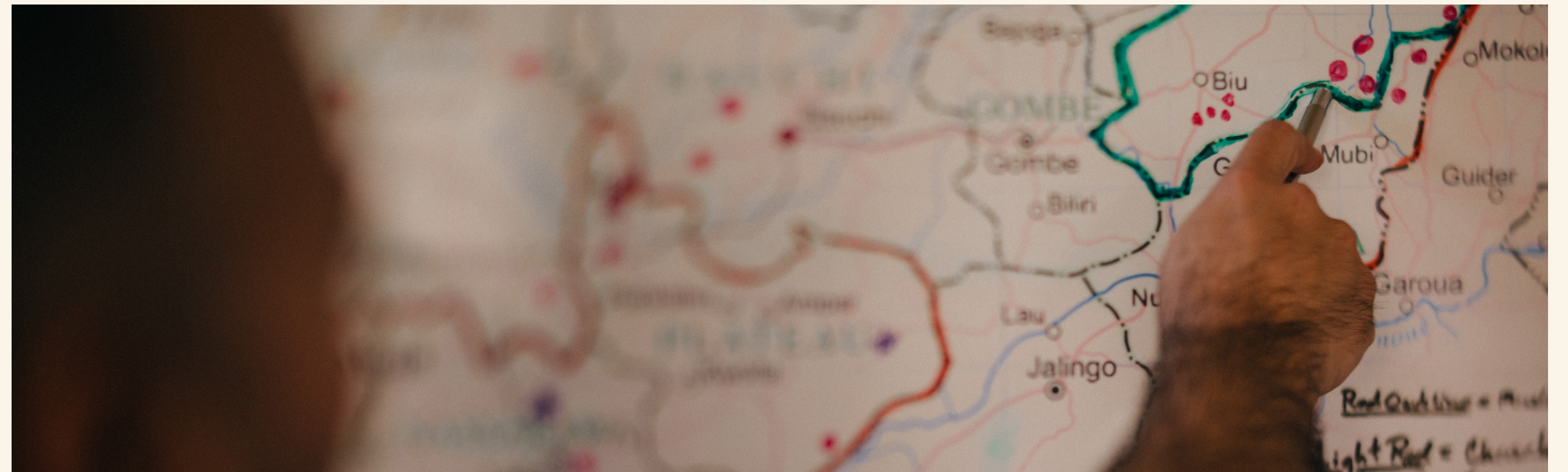

Restoration and Hope

With 27.6 million victims of human trafficking worldwide, one wonders how these individuals end up in such terrible situations. Poverty is the primary driving force, according to one anonymous Gateway ministry partner. Deviant organizations will pay parents to exploit themselves and their own children.

It happens in the world's poorest regions, and it also happens here in the United States. While most human trafficking involves the sex trade, many trafficked individuals are forced to do hard labor. Some, including children, are coerced into being soldiers.

The numbers are trending upward, due in part to how easy it is to bring someone into slavery and how difficult it is to get them out. Our ministry partner, however, is doing amazing work rescuing and restoring victims and advocating for change.

Just last year, they were able to rescue almost 1,500 victims and bring the perpetrators to justice. Gateway helped provide funding for these operations.

One young Nigerian woman believed she was being recruited for a job in Europe but ended up in the Middle East. After two years, she gained access to a phone and quickly called her brother back home. Through friends, he was able to reach our ministry partner, and they came to the rescue, using technology and military precision to free her along with 20 other victims.

“Gateway has funded our technology items, travel, and other aspects of our work,” says a representative from our ministry partner. “Gateway made a way to help us, and I’m grateful for that.”

Life in the Desert

The Middle East has historically been a volatile region, but right now there is an increasing number of displaced people and refugees. With so many passing through the food-scarce regions there, Gateway learned of a huge need in Lebanon. In 2025, we partnered with True Vine Church in Zahle, Lebanon, to fund a new hydroponic growing system on the church's farmland. This system is already producing crops and is projected to increase True Vine's total crop yield elevenfold.

This means they can feed the influx of Syrian refugees, most of whom are Muslim. And if there is ever a surplus, they can bring fresh produce to the market. What's remarkable about this project isn't simply that the generosity of Gateway's people is feeding the hungry around the world—it provides a self-sustaining solution for them. We aren't just providing food once, we're helping provide a way for them to have up to eleven harvests per year.

"We have thousands of refugees coming from Syria, and our ministry can now serve 2,000 families per month," says Pastor Jihad Haddad who leads True Vine Church. "It's an open door to show them the love of Christ, show them the true faith God has put in our hearts, and lead them to know Christ as their Savior."

This project will fund itself long-term. And the best part? It's repeatable. We look forward to providing more hydroponic growing systems to other food-scarce regions around the world and helping ministries on the ground to reach their neighbors with the love of Christ.

Garden of Life

The Willow Lane Park on the edge of Gateway's Dallas Campus was originally intended to beautify the surrounding community. Built years before Gateway occupied the property, it has fallen into a state of disrepair. It collects stagnant water and creates a breeding ground for mosquitoes. And, perhaps worst of all, it smells horrible. Thankfully, it's on the edge of the property and on the other side of a wall, so no one from Gateway ever noticed it.

For the residents nearby, however, it's a blight on the neighborhood.

Most of these residents belong to a Jewish eruv (tight-knit community). When they walk to their synagogue several times a week, they must avoid this area. This problem has aggravated the relationship between the church and the surrounding Jewish community.

In fact, it wasn't until a Gateway pastor reached out to

neighboring synagogues and the homeowner's association that we realized the problem existed. Gateway decided to not only improve the land but take it a step further, renaming the park "The Rosian Bagriansky Zerner Garden of Life."

Ms. Zerner, the namesake of the park, is a 90-year-old Holocaust survivor who lives in North Texas. "I'm all for bonding with Christian and Jewish relations. We all need to support each other," says Ms. Zerner. "So for me, it was not only an honor but a total blessing, and I'm grateful to Gateway Church for all the courtesies they've extended to me throughout the years."

The garden will feature several plaques detailing her story of survival, along with plaques honoring other Holocaust survivors who have made their homes in North Texas.

"The park project actually came out of our relationship with

the Jewish community," says Landon Benjamin, Dallas Campus Pastor. "When we reached out to them, we found ways we could be a better neighbor."

The project would be an expensive one, but Gateway member Sharron O'Neill made a generous donation toward the project. Sharron has a special connection to the project. "My daughter and her family live just behind the Dallas Campus," she says. "I didn't want Gateway to have a stigma in the eruv that they don't care."

She says after talking to her daughter and son-in-law, the Jewish community is beginning to warm to the Dallas Campus, which is proving to be a good neighbor after all. The benefits of this project are already coming to fruition.

"Our church gained two new families after we began this project," says Pastor Landon. "We can't be like Jesus if we can't be a good neighbor."

2026 YOUTH CAMP

In February, **1,070 STUDENTS** converged on the Lakeview Camp & Retreat Center in Waxahachie, Texas, for YouthCAMP, or as students call it, “the best weekend ever.” Split up into two weekends—one weekend for junior high and one for high school students—YouthCAMP is designed to help students encounter the presence of God in a meaningful way and lay the foundation for a lifelong relationship with Him.
